School Office:

The school office hours are 7:30 A.M. to 3:15 P.M
Classes begin at 8:05 A.M. Students arriving after this time will be considered tardy.

Parent Phone Calls:

Calls to Your Children – Emergency Only

Our classrooms are very productive learning communities, please do not place calls to the classroom during the school day. When **urgent information** needs to be communicated to your child, contact the school office.

Visits to Capitol Hill:

Parents are welcome to visit Capitol Hill. Prior notice will help make the visit more effective. Also, to maintain the flow of the classroom, please limit your stay to 15-20 minutes.

All visitors must report first to the Capitol Hill office and receive a visitor's badge to wear while they are in the building

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Library/Media Center:

Use after School Hours

The library/media center is open until 3:30 P.M. on most days. Capitol Hill students may use the media center after school hours for study purposes or computer use to complete class assignments. The librarian has many responsibilities at this time of the day, so students are asked to be on their best behavior. Pre-approval with the media center teacher is necessary.

Student Drop-off and Pick-up

Before and after school

Student safety is our top priority and your help in following these guidelines is crucial.

Drop Off

Students should not arrive before 7:40 A.M.

Students arriving between 7:40-7:50 AM need to report to the cafeteria.

Breakfast is served beginning at 7:40 A.M.

Blue Door –

Please drop off your child in the parking lot at the Blue Door. Parents are not to use the bus lane for pick up or drop off. Students should use the crosswalk at all times.

Green Door –

The Green Door on the east side of the building will also be open from 7:45-8:10 A.M. for drop off purposes.

Red and Yellow Doors –

You may drop off your child in the parking lot at the Red and Yellow Doors.

Martin Luther King Door –

You may NOT park in the Martin Luther King Center parking lot. Cars left unattended are subject to being towed.

Pick Up

Regular dismissal time is 2:35 P.M. Students need to be picked up by 2:45 P.M. unless they are enrolled in after school sports or activities.

Pick up at the Blue Door is hectic at dismissal time, but it is the most supervised area.

Students may exit from the Green Door on the East side (Mackubin Street) from 2:35 - 2:50 P.M. only. After that time, students will be sent to the Blue Door. If Capitol Hill supervisors are not present, all students should remain inside the blue doors until their transportation arrives.

After 4:00 P.M. All students must be picked up at the red doors.

Busing

Bus transportation is provided for students who reside over one mile from the school and students who must cross “hazardous” streets within the attendance area of the school. **Students are not allowed to ride a bus other than their assigned route and must exit and board at their assigned stop.**

Questions regarding bus routes should be directed to the office. Please provide change of addresses in a timely manner; it takes approximately 3-5 days to establish a new bus stop.

Capitol Hill office staff and the District’s transportation department work together to establish, change, and monitor Capitol Hill bus routes.

Busing is a privilege. Transported students are assigned a pick-up and drop-off corner and are required to get on and off the bus at their designated corners. Parents and

guardians are responsible for supervising their children (for their safety) as they travel between home and the school bus stop and while waiting for the bus to arrive.

Students can have a different AM and PM bus stops however; they must come from the same AM address 5 days a week and go to the same PM address 5 days a week.

Each transported student has the right to a safe and enjoyable ride to and from school free from intimidation, threat, or harassment. Good conduct of all students while waiting for the school bus and while traveling to and from school is primary to a safe and enjoyable ride for all students. Students who display unacceptable behavior will be disciplined. Incidents of unacceptable behavior will have their riding privileges suspended or revoked. The District **will not** provide alternative transportation and it becomes the parent / guardian's responsibility to transport their child to and from school. **Suspension of riding privileges affects transportation to and from school, as well as field trips.**

The transportation policies are set by the District.

Lost and Found

Lost and found boxes are located in the nurse's office. Smaller items such as keys and glasses are kept in a basket in the main office. Lost and found items not claimed are donated after Fall Conferences, before Winter Break, after Spring Conferences and at the end of the school year.

Toys and Electronics (Walkmans, CD Players, Gameboys, Trading/Game Cards <any

trading game cards>, Cameras, Phones, MP3 Players and Other Electronic Devices.)

Use of the above items during the school day is not permitted. Students who violate this policy will have the device confiscated and returned to their parents/guardians. The school is not responsible for replacing or recovering these items in the event they are damaged or stolen. We encourage parents to remind their child(ren) to keep these items at home.

Cell Phones:

We recognize that many parents have purchased cell phones to communicate with children before and after school. Therefore, we will allow students to have cell phones in school; however, they must be turned off and not in use during school hours. If parents must contact their child during the school day, it can be done through the school office

Breakfasts and Lunches

Breakfasts and lunches prepared by the St. Paul Public Schools' Food Service are available for purchase every day. For your convenience, a monthly menu is sent home with your child. You may also go to the district web site www.spps.org. Go to Parents and "What's for Lunch?" to find menus and other food service information.

Students are encouraged to pay for meals at least one week in advance. Money should be put into an envelope with the child's name, followed by the teacher's name, room number, and PIN. **Checks should be made out to Nutrition Services. Please write the child's name and PIN on the check.**

Each student is given a 4 or 5 digit PIN number for meal purchases. Students are informed when they have a low balance. Parents can get information regarding a child's account balance by calling the school and requesting assistance from the Rondo Center Food Service Supervisor at 325-2671. Account balances from last school year will be carried over when beginning the new school year.

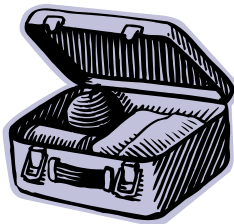
If there is a need for free or reduced-price meals, please complete the Free/Reduced Price Meal application. If a child's account balance reaches zero, students may be provided a cheese sandwich and milk.

Breakfast is served from 7:40 – 8:00 A.M. If buses are late, students will be served upon arrival.

Lunch is served between 10:40 – 1:00 P.M. A schedule is available in the main office listing the times each individual class has lunch time.

SCHOOL MEAL LINES ARE CASHLESS. Please make sure that pre-payment for food has been made. Cash and checks will NOT be taken during meal service.

Attendance

According to Minnesota State compulsory attendance laws Students are expected to attend school every day except when excused.

The burden of a child being excused from school is placed on the parent / guardian of the child. **A school has the right to accept or deny a reason for an absence.** The Truancy Intervention Program (TIP) and the Family Truancy Intervention Program (FTIP) are programs of the Ramsey County Attorney's Office, in collaboration with local neighborhood support agencies and the St. Paul Public Schools. They focus on excessive unexcused student **tardiness** and **absences** in compliance with the Minnesota attendance laws. If a student is tardy 5 times, we will begin the TIP process immediately. **The school is required to report excessive tardies / absences to the appropriate agencies.**

Examples of Acceptable Reasons for Being Absent

- Sickness (Doctor Verification may be requested)
- Doctor / Dental appointments
- Extreme family emergencies
- Religious Holidays
- Prior Approved Travel / Vacation (Travel forms are available on the website.)

Examples of Unacceptable / Unlawful Reasons for Being Absent

- Staying home to baby-sit
- Overslept/Too Tired
- Missed Bus or Bus Suspension
- Weather
- Needed at home
- Work
- Travel / Vacation that does not have prior approval from the school

Please call 651-325-2599 to report an absence. If we do not receive a phone call, we assume your child should be in school. We call the homes of any absent child who has not been accounted for by a phone call.

District policy states that all children absent from school for illness or other reasons must present a written excuse from a parent or guardian before being readmitted to class.

Students tardy to school

Valid excuses for tardiness are medical or dental appointments; or a late school bus as verified by district officials. **After a total of 5 days of unexcused tardies, the school shall begin the TIP process immediately.**

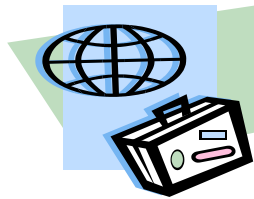
The TIP process begins by a phone call to the parent/guardian informing them of excessive tardiness and the need to be in school. If tardiness continues, a letter will be sent home.

Guidelines for Student Travel

Truancy laws outline acceptable and unlawful excuses for student absences and allow schools to develop policies to determine whether an absence is counted as excused or unexcused. While recognizing that travel can provide many educational opportunities for students, certain criteria must be met for student absences to be counted as excused. Whenever possible, travel should be completed during vacation times to limit the number of instructional days students miss.

If a student will be absent due to travel, please complete the student travel form. The form must be submitted to the front office 2 weeks prior to travel for the absence to be counted as excused. This form is located on the school's website or can be obtained in the office. A student's academic progress must be

at an acceptable level for travel to be approved. Due to the high volume of travel, an attempt will be made to provide students with their work in advance only if the travel request form is turned in 2 weeks prior to travel. Work may have to be completed upon a student's return depending on the class assignments and when the travel request was made.



Conferences

Student conferences are scheduled twice a year, November and March, and include 2 evenings and 1 day of conference times. These are merely the District scheduled conference times; if you feel you need additional conferences, please contact your child's teacher to arrange a conference.

Parents / guardians of children in grades 1-6 will have an arranged conference time with the classroom teacher. Conferences for students in grades 7- 8 will be held in the gymnasium so parents/guardians have an opportunity to visit with all of their child's teachers.

Parent Portal

Parent Portal is a web site allowing parents to access their student's records. In grades 7-8, parents may access attendance, schedules, grades, progress reports and additional information about their child as it becomes available on the web site. Parents of students in grades 1-6, may access student attendance and other information. You may enter and/or sign up for Parent Portal through <http://www.spps.org/parents.html> on the right side of the page in the middle or <http://connect.spps.org/> on the bottom right side.

School Policies

School policies cover a diverse range of subjects. Some are defined by the School District, others by the School Administrative Team. Information on specific policies can be obtained from the school office.

Release of students from school:

No student will be allowed to leave school, during regular school hours, unless picked up by a parent/guardian or appropriately designated adult. The parent/guardian must sign the student out in the main office.

If students need to leave school during the school day, they need to bring a note signed by their parent/guardian. All students should bring the note to the Ms. McRae, Attendance Liaison, in the morning, to receive an "Excuse to Leave the Building" pass. Students need to sign back in when they return.

Pesticides

In accordance with Minnesota Statute 123.B.575, **Parents Right to Know Act**, all parents, guardians and employees are advised that an estimated schedule of applications of pesticides is available in the school's office for review or copying. In addition, any parent or guardian who wishes to be notified of any variation from this schedule may be notified by providing five self-addressed, stamped envelopes to the school to be used throughout the year for mailing purposes. The schedule and subsequent notices apply only to pesticides in toxicity categories I, II, or III as classified by the United States Environmental Protection Agency, or a restricted-use pesticide as designated by federal law.

Behavior:

The philosophy at Capitol Hill is to create a positive learning environment through positive reinforcement of appropriate behaviors. We believe that:

- o Everyone has the right to learn, and no one has the right to interfere with another's learning.
- o Everyone's dignity, welfare, and material possessions should be respected.
- o Every child can succeed.

Behavioral problems are initially addressed by the classroom teacher and/or support staff. Administration will become involved if the behavior is severe or if it continues. Consequences may include removal from class, detention, parent/guardian conference, dismissal or suspension, and Saturday School for students in grades 7 and 8. Suspensions are determined after an in-depth investigation of the situation and in accordance with the Minnesota Pupil Fair Dismissal Act. Examples of incidents which could result in suspension are fighting,

willful disobedience, defiance, theft, pyrotechnic devices, threats, sexual or racial harassment, vandalism or willful damage of school property, gang or cult activity, drugs, alcohol or tobacco and possession of a weapon.

Capitol Hill follows the Saint Paul Public School District Conduct / Rights and Responsibilities Guide when a dismissal or suspension is necessary.

A parent / guardian conference with administration is requested before a child returns to school following a suspension.

Detention:

Students in grades 7-8, if issued detention, will serve it during their lunch time or other time as arranged through staff. Other grade levels may also have detention times during lunch or as arranged by staff.

Dress Code:

The rules of the season and good taste should prevail with regard to school dress. Please keep in mind the following guidelines:

1. Clothing or jewelry depicting sexual sayings, and /or advertising illegal substances, or considered unsafe will not be allowed.
2. Clothing must be worn in an appropriate manner. Examples include: Shoes need to be worn for safety and should be appropriate for school. Shoes with wheels are not to be worn in school.
3. Clothing and other items reflecting gang affiliation will not be tolerated.
4. No outerwear (jackets, windbreakers, gloves, etc.) may be worn in class.
5. Clothing should be appropriate for a school setting; halter tops, spaghetti straps, short shorts and short skirts, sagging pants, etc. are not allowed.
6. Hats or head gear of any kind may not be worn in school.

Food - Treats

Students bringing food to share with others need to make sure the food is “store purchased,” and unopened

Harassment/Bias:

The Saint Paul Board of Education has revised the Racial Bias Policy 413.00 and the Harassment, Violence and Other Offensive Behavior Policy 415.00. A copy of the policy is available in the school office. The purpose of the policies is to maintain a respectful learning and work environment in Saint Paul Public Schools. The Rights and Responsibilities Student Handbook also has information pertaining to the above policies.

Homework:

Homework is a necessary and integral part of the learning process. It is expected every student in the Saint Paul Public Schools will receive homework.

Students in grades 7 – 8 will be given progress reports for parents to verify the child is completing and turning in homework. Parents will also receive mid-term progress reports. Check the calendar in the back of the handbook for dates. Students in grades 7- 8 have a specific homework policy which will be discussed at the Parent Information Night in September for Junior High. Parents may monitor their child’s progress through the use of the Parent Portal available on the district web site.

Lockers:

All students in grades 1-8 are provided with a locker. In addition, students in grades 7- 8 are issued a lock. Students in grades 1-6 may bring a lock, but their homeroom teacher must be provided with keys or combination code.

Students in grades 7 - 8 are responsible for making sure that the lock is properly locked at all times. Students will be charged \$ 5.00 to replace missing locks.

Locker searches can and will take place if administration is given information that illegal and/or dangerous items are in the lockers. Locker clean out will be held as needed for the purpose of maintaining a pleasant and safe environment. Students should use masking tape or magnets if they wish to hang pictures or information within the locker.

School closing:

When the District closes all schools due to the weather, it will be announced on WCCO Radio, 830 AM or the District's website at www.spps.org, search school closing Or try this link: http://www.spps.org/school_closing.html

Student use of school telephone:

School phones are to be used only for school business. Students must have the permission of their teacher or office staff to use the phone in the main office.

Pledge of Allegiance

Minnesota law requires all public school students to recite the Pledge of Allegiance at least once a week (unless the local school board annually votes to waive this requirement). At Capitol Hill the pledge will be recited each Monday morning, over the loud speaker, by administrative staff.

“Anyone who does not wish to participate in reciting the pledge of allegiance for any personal reason may elect not to do so.

Students must respect another person’s right to make that choice.” MN Statute 121A.11(3)(b).

Capitol Hill Site Council

The goal of the Site Council is to increase student achievement through its efforts in developing and implementing Capitol Hill’s School Continuous Improvement Plan. This plan includes budgeting concerns and program development. It is the responsibility of the Site Council to provide a unified voice in addressing District initiatives as they affect the Capitol Hill Community in an advisory capacity.

Officers, Committees and members will be listed in the new Capitol Hill Directory. Site Council meetings will be held the 2nd Monday of month, unless announced otherwise. Committee meetings will be posted. See the school calendar for exact dates. All meetings are open to the Capitol Hill Community.

Parent Teacher Organization (P.T.O.)

We welcome all parents / guardians, teachers and staff to become members of PTO. The purpose of PTO is to support the Capitol Hill community through organization, volunteer work and fund-raising. Meetings are held the 1st Monday of the month. Committee meetings will be posted on the Web Site. Officers and Committees will be listed in the Capitol Hill Directory.



Enrichment Opportunities

Science Olympiad:

Junior high students work with a parent leader participating in this national competition. Fifteen-member teams compete in a series of events covering a wide spectrum of science topics at a regional competition in February.

Destination Imagination:

Students work with a parent leader from January through March to creatively solve a complex problem and present their solution in a regional competition held in March.

Math Team:

A team of 25 junior high students participates in this after school activity which includes 5 Math League meets and statewide competition. Capitol Hill has won the state competition and sent students on to national level competition in past years.

Debate Team:

Students from the 8th grade Debate classes participate in after school competitions against other schools.

Community Education Classes:

The Rondo Center Community Education Program offers a variety of classes throughout the year. Flyers are generally sent home with students, but are also available in the office. There is no transportation provided for Community Ed classes and a minimal fee is charged for each class. Please contact the Community Education office at 651-325-2672 to find out more about the wonderful opportunities available to your child.

After School Languages:

French, Spanish, and Chinese are available after school through Community Education.

Tutoring:

Various teachers hold after school tutoring, in addition to the clubs run by Community Education. If you feel your

child needs assistance, please contact their classroom teacher to find out what is available.

Athletics:

Athletic programs are available for students in grades 7 and 8. These are interscholastic programs competing against other Saint Paul Public schools. Each season runs for approximately 9 weeks. Capitol Hill participates in the following sports:

Fall flag football, volleyball, soccer

Winter basketball, wrestling

Spring baseball, softball, track & field, badminton

Students must have a current physical on file with the school nurse in order to participate and meet eligibility requirements. In addition there is a fee for participation; this fee is waived for students who qualify for free or reduced lunches.

Instrumental Music Program:

Capitol Hill offers a variety of instrumental music programs: Suzuki violin and cello, Orchestra, and Band. Interested students are assigned instruments after meeting with the Instrumental Music Teacher. Parents/guardians rent or purchase instruments from area music stores.

If interested, please contact the school to find out more information about specific programs.

Special Education & Support Services

Special education programs and support services are available to students who qualify in the areas of learning disabilities, speech and language, adaptive physical education, occupational therapy, and emotional/behavioral disorders.

To gain access to special education programs and support services, a Child Study Team must first evaluate children. Teachers or parents can initiate an evaluation. Prior to requesting permission for assessment, appropriate interventions within the mainstream classroom must take place.

In addition to special education services, Capitol Hill employs a School Social Worker to assist students. In general, parent / guardians are notified if their child is to receive services. There are times when this is not done due to data privacy and child protection issues.

Notes from the Nurse

Illness:

If your child has signs of illness at the beginning of the school day, check his/her temperature. Keep your child home if his/her temperature is 100 degrees Fahrenheit or greater. The child should not return to school until the temperature is below 100 degrees for 24 hours. If a child has diarrhea or vomiting, they should not return to school until 24 hours after it has stopped. Sending sick children to school is hard on them and can expose others to contagious illnesses. When a child has a communicable disease, the school nurse must be notified so that the parents of classmates can be informed.

After beginning an antibiotic, your child must remain at home for a full 24 hours before they are considered noncontagious.

Emergency Contact:

If a child needs to go home during the school day due to illness or injury, parents need to be reached. To facilitate this process, it is imperative that adequate phone numbers are provided when the emergency form is completed. **You MUST provide for the school your**

1) home phone number, 2) cell phone number and 3) work number. If you do not have these, other numbers must be provided to insure we can contact you. Please include the name of both parents and the numbers where they may be reached. **It is very important to keep the emergency form current.** Please notify the school of any changes.

Medication Policy:

The Saint Paul Public School District policy is that all medication taken by a student at school must be under direct adult supervision. Before the school nurse or any delegate may administer medication of any kind to a student, a permission form signed by a physician is needed and the parent must also give written consent. All medications must be brought in a bottle currently labeled by a physician or pharmacy.

Consent forms are available from the school nurse and must be renewed each school year or each time a medication is changed during the school year. A parent / guardian may come to school and administer medication to his/her child without a consent form.
